Our club is 34 years old ! Early in 1975, the members of the Rotary Club of Norwood decided to relinquish some of its territory to enable a new Rotary Club to be formed. District Governor Geoff Evans approved and appointed Past President Wal Alm of the Norwood Club to be his Special Representative for the formation of the new Club.

Wal co-opted several other members of his Club to assist. Good progress was made in recruiting likely members and this enabled the formation meeting to be held on Wednesday, 9 April, 1975 at Tower House, Beaumont when 27 men decided to become Charter members.

The Club was admitted to membership in Rotary International on 2 May, 1975,

making it the 65th Club in District 250, and the Charter was presented by DG Geoff C. Evans at the Hotel Australia on Friday 20 June, 1975.

DG Geoff was at the time a member of The Rotary Club of Port Pirie and his term of office as Governor ended on 30 June, 1975. After presenting the Charter, DG Geoff was inducted as a member of the Rotary Club of Burnside, the first Club member to be District Governor

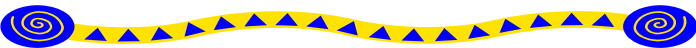


Soke Rotary Club of District 2440 Turkey is looking for a project partner to match a grant with the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. Soke, a town located in the province of Aydin, Turkey, has a total population of 80,000 and 300,000 people with its surrounding villages. It has a large agricultural land and it is one of the biggest cotton producing area of Turkey. The 25 members of the Soke Rotary Club, consisting of 19 Paul Harris Fellow member, 1 Benefactor and 6 PHSM, have been providing services to this area for the last 22 years.

The government of Turkey has put forth a lot of effort to reform the education system and has started by passing a law which requires children to stay in school for 8 years rather than the required 5 years previously. The school needs to have a computer lab so that students can get introduced to the latest technologies at an earlier age. The Soke Rotary Club has decided to establish 1 computer laboratory that will consist of 30 computers. The lab will need to have one main machine with 29 terminals. The overall cost of the laboratory is US \$15,600. The Soke Rotary Club is prepared to donate US \$5,200. Another US \$5,200 is to be raised through partner Rotary Club and it is hoped that the Rotary Foundation can match the grant with the remaining US \$5,200.

Scholarship gives break to young French journalists

Le Rotarien, the certified Rotary regional magazine of France and 38 other Francophone countries, serves more than 39,000 Rotarians. Now through a scholarship program developed in 2002, it also fosters the careers of budding journalists.



The magazine awards four scholarships up to €10,000 (US\$13,750) to young journalists to create a short digital video documentary. The jury includes *Le Rotarien* staff, journalism school professors, and independent media executives.

“The award is an excellent way to develop relationships with the journalist teachers in the 12 major journalism schools in France,” says Brigitte Marquand, the magazine’s public relations and media specialist. “It also helps improve the public image of Rotary in the press circle.”

Alexandre Paré, one of the 2008 recipients, recently graduated from the Centre de Formation des Journalistes in Paris. He now works as a broadcast journalist for BFMTV, a rising 24-hour French cable news network.

For Paré, whose film on a hospital train in Zambia was scheduled for completion in March, the scholarship is worth years of experience in the field.

“There are very famous journalists on the jury, and it was very thrilling to convince them that my project was worth filming,” Paré says. “It’s the best encouragement you can get as a journalist.”

The 32 [Rotary World Magazine Press](#) publications are vital to spreading Rotary International’s messages throughout the world. All Rotarians are required to take either [The Rotarian](#) or the regional magazine serving their area. District governors can support the regional magazines by encouraging timely subscription payment by all club members and sending article ideas to the editors.
