THE OBJECTS OF ROTARY

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- **First:** The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.
- **Second:** High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying by each Rotarian of their occupation as an opportunity to serve society.
- **Third:** The application of the ideal of service by every Rotarian to their personal, business and community life.
- **Fourth:** The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional people united in the ideal of service.

From the objects of Rotary follow the Four Avenues of Service

Club Service - The running of the club and attaining good attendance and a fellowship amongst members.

Vocational Service - with the well known "Four Way Test."

Community Service - Referring to our own community.

International Service - To promote international understanding, goodwill and peace.

Charter of the Rotary Club of Glenelg Inc.

The Rotary Club of Adelaide was Chartered in 1923 and was in District 33 which covered the whole of South Australia and the western section of Victoria. The area extended as far east as Ballarat and included Warrnambool, Stawell and Horsham.

This then produced District Conferences as far away from Adelaide as Lorne, and we have transcripts of these early conferences. The Adelaide Club was chartered in 1923, Mount Gambier in 1928, Unley in 1935, Port Adelaide in 1946, Victor Harbor in 1947, Port Lincoln in 1949, Prospect in 1950, Naracoorte in 1951, and Woodville in 1951.

Glenelg was to be the next club chartered in South Australia.

In 1952 the District Governor appointed as his special representative, Arthur Sampson from the Adelaide Club, to form a Rotary Club in the area of Glenelg. A Steering Committee was formed with Owen Bowering and Bill Sage from the southern end of the territory, and Jack Hoepfer from the northern end.

The Provisional Club was organised at a meeting in the No.2 Community Room at the Glenelg Town Hall on the 27th March 1952. Present were the Charter members, Arthur Sampson, the District Governor Len Clarkson and Rotarian Grant Noble. The next meeting was with the Adelaide Club on the 2nd April.

On Anzac Day, 25th April, 1952, The Rotary Club of Glenelg was admitted to Rotary International.

The Club received the official charter at a dinner at the Pier Hotel on Saturday, 26th July 1952. The Charter President was Arthur Wenzel with 23 Charter Members – Arthur remained a member until his death in 1989. The official Charter documents are included elsewhere in this book.

The first meeting venue was Russell Court (formerly called “The Olives” and a most historic and beautiful mansion) which was a high

profile reception house in Glenelg, and at sometime owned by Eric White, a charter member. The meeting day was Wednesday as it has remained for the past 50 years. At the time of our charter, the boundaries were the Municipality of Glenelg, Municipality of Brighton, and the Municipality of Marion.

1952-1953 Arthur WENZEL
(Charter President)

Arthur Wenzel was a compulsive community worker and was a long serving member of Glenelg Council and Mayor for several terms. Meetings were in Russell Court and by the end of this first Rotary year Stan Engelhardt, Stan Fereday, Roy Jenkins, Ivor Lewis, Ron Lloyd, Ross Moody, Joe Norman, Morn Wadham and Bill Western had joined the Club.



1953-1954 Owen BOWERING

R.I. Theme : "Rotary is Hope in Action"

Owen, a general medical practitioner in the Brighton area, was very active in medical education, medical politics and sports medicine for the Glenelg Football Club.

During this year the first fund raising event was held - a dinner dance in the Glenelg Town Hall.



1954 – 1955 Geoff FORD

**R.I. Theme : "Glean from the Past and Act –
Share with Others"**

Charter member of the Club and member of the first Board. He was in the motor industry first on Jetty Rd. Glenelg, and then later on Brighton Rd. Geoff was a President of the Glenelg Football Club.



1955-1956 Jack CHASTON

R.I. Theme : "Develop our Resources"

Charter member of the Club and member of the first Board. We have not been able to access records of these years but we do know that members were very good Conference attendees despite the distance travelled to Western Victoria



1956-1957 Jack HOEPER

Other"**

Charter member of the Club and member of the first Board. He opened several large supermarkets and was a most successful businessman. Jack's wife, Lois, is very active in Inner Wheel and is a past District Governor of that organisation. His daughter Cathy and son Trent were members of the Glenelg Rotaract Club. Sadly Jack's later life was one of severe illness.



1957-1958 Stan FEREDAY

Stan was a builder who migrated with his family from England in 1949 and developed the area now known as Glengowrie and Hamilton Park. The highlight of the year was the hosting of the District Conference for District 250 which was opened by The Premier, Sir Thomas Playford (covered elsewhere in this report). A Charter was presented to the Rotary Club of Edwardstown at a special dinner at the Myer Apollo Centre with 300 guests attending. Charter President Mark Curtis received the Charter from DG Arthur Sampson and the President of the Glenelg Club (Sponsor Club) Stan Fereday.



1958-1959 Blair LAKE

R.I. Theme : "Help Shape the Future"

At the beginning of this Rotary year the membership had increased to 45, and the club was riding on the success of the District Conference.



1959-1960 Ron LLOYD

Rector of St. Judes Church, Brighton.
Rotary's first family to be flown to Australia in the "Bring a Briton" scheme arrived in Adelaide. The family Mr & Mrs Kenneth Adams and four children were sponsored by the Rotary Club of Glenelg, and were welcomed at the Adelaide Railway Station by President Ron Lloyd.
The Adams Family were the third family to be sponsored by the Club.

The Club paid off a debt of £1,750 for the Brighton Meals on Wheels. Ivor Lewis did interior improvements to the kitchen.

This was the last year that the weekly bulletin was produced by the President (usually on a Sunday night with his wife playing a major role) and from then on we had an appointed editor.

The first Warrabundi Festival was held on the Brighton Football Club oval on 3rd March 1962 and raised a total of £850. A dinner-dance was held in the Masonic Hall in Margaret Ave., Somerton Park raising £1,179 to aid the Brighton Meals on Wheels.

The Club decorated a rest room at the Kate Cocks Home, Brighton. On the Vocational Service side, two information boards for student guidance were installed at the Brighton and Seacombe High Schools.



1962-1963 Angus NEILL

R.I. Theme : "Kindle the Spark Within"

David Jones as Community Service Director starts the planning programme for the Glenelg Senior Citizen's building and Club. At a meeting of the Club on September 19th 1962 where the guest speaker told of "The Problems of Old People", the Club announced that it would proceed with the Senior Citizens Centre. The Glenelg Council offered a block of land to build the Centre. Two sites were offered, one west of the Town Hall, and one facing Colley Reserve. The latter was agreed. This was to be a joint project between the Rotary Club of Glenelg and the Apex Club of Glenelg.



1963-1964 Clive NETTLETON

R.I. Theme : "Meeting Rotary's Challenge in the The Space Age"

On 24th May 1964, the foundation stone was laid for the building of the Senior Citizen's Club.

A special dinner was held at the Pier Hotel, Glenelg attended by the then Governor of South Australia

A Club visit was arranged to Whyalla to see the Whyalla Steel Works and was an enjoyable occasion, and good with fellowship. It is understood that Clive was the only president to this date to have a pregnant wife during his period as President.

Clive's comment on his year - " Wonderful fellowship from a great group of people."



1964-1965 Blair FERGUSON

R.I. Theme : "Live Rotary"

Blair had the Electrical Retrovision store opposite the Brighton Hotel.

The Senior Citizens Club – rooms were officially opened on 8th November 1964 by Professor Sir Stanton Hicks.

Blair continued the Warrabundi Festival, which raised funds for Club Projects for a number of years.

He also owned a shack at Port Broughton, and club members had a number of pleasant weekends enjoying his hospitality. Blair unfortunately contracted leukaemia and retired to Kangaroo Island.



1965-1966 Ted S. RAGGATT

Ted was Headmaster of the Glenelg Primary School.



1966-1967 Colin STEELE

R.I. Theme : "A Better World Through Rotary"

The Rotaryannes formed themselves into a group with Joan Steele as President, and arranged a Ladies Luncheon which raised \$240.

On 24 th June 1967 the Glenelg Meals on Wheels kitchen, built by Glenelg Rotary Club at a cost of \$14,000, was officially opened by Sir Roland Jacobs. This was a joint project between the Club, Lions & Apex.

Social & fundraising events included a "South Seas Island Feast" at the home of Jill & Don Cant, the Combined Rotary Club Ball for "Miss Rotary 1966", a Mannequin Parade at the Marion Hotel and a golf day at Ashbourne.

A new venture in hosting the Club's first Exchange Student – Mike Williams from Estes Park in Colorado, and three girls, Katherine Houghton, Dianne Gilbert, and Stephanie Wicks were selected as Outbound Students for 1968-1969.

One of the highlights was the Vocational Service Apprentice night when 42 apprentices were addressed by the British and Australian Apprentices of the Year. Another was the Vocational Dinner at the Police Headquarters. International Service Committee sent six cases of books to schools in Fiji, and another 30 cases to schools in New Guinea. P.P. and Assistant D.G. Clive Nettleton, P.P. Blair Ferguson and Rtn. Alex Sowden, surveyed and sponsored the new Rotary Club of Noarlunga.

Four Exchange Students were sent overseas at the beginning of 1968 and a student from U.S.A. (Mike Williams) arrived in Nov.1967. We hosted a G.S.E. team from New Mexico for three days. Rotarians had a weekend at Pt. Broughton and a wine tasting at the home of Norm Brooks. Service awards were presented to students at Brighton High, Brighton Boys Technical and Dover Gardens Girls Technical Schools.

A sum of money was sent to enable the people of Cambarra, Fiji, to have a water tank erected.

Junior reading text books, drawing books, and coloured pencils were forwarded to a hospital in Ben Hua, South Vietnam.

Local charities benefited from over \$1,200 raised by Director Doug Barton and his Community Service Committee. Loene Allen (daughter of Lloyd and Anne) was Miss Glenelg Rotary Queen. Ladies group (Rotaryannes) formed and worked for Kate Cocks Babies' Home and Miss Rotary Quest.

An interesting programme event was the night that the ladies took over and showed us how to run a meeting !!

John had a Plumbing business in Glenelg. He owned a shack on Mundoo Island at Goolwa which was the site of some Rotary fellowship.

John was involved in the establishment of the Brighton Meals on Wheels, undertaking all the plumbing work, and he also assisted with Meals on Wheels in Glenelg and Unley, and was on the State Executive from 1961/1962. He and his wife developed a strong friendship with the founder of Meals on Wheels, Mrs Doris Taylor.

\$360 was given to the Vietnam Christian School programme. Edwardstown formed our first grand-daughter club Marion.

The Club hosted Holly Hammond from U.S.A. and Hiroko Yano from Japan. Two students were selected for outbound exchange in 1975-1976, Jenny Gibbons & Jane Guthrie, both off to USA.

Donations included \$570 to the Darwin Cyclone Relief, \$210 to St. Johns for "Anatomical Annie", \$710 to District 250 Elderly Citizens Units,

(making total \$1,513 and \$500 to the Ludhianna Hospital in India. Community Service was involved with the continuation of the Senior Citizens Craft Centre, however, the Playground & Patawalonga Beautification Scheme was delayed because of new Federal grants, and further clarification by the Glenelg Council. Classification led to some problems with membership, arguments within the Club and the resignation of Peter Jarvis. The Rota News was handed out at meetings, instead of being posted. 24 members went on a fishing trip to Warooka - members Alf Wadham and Norm Brooks had shacks there. 11 members and 8 ladies attended the District Conference in Broken Hill. Wine tasting and egg combo night, B.B.Q. at Hoffman's winery and progressive dinner were amongst social events.

The 25th Anniversary of the Club was celebrated with a dinner at the Glenelg Footballers’ Club with more than 200 Rotarians attending to hear guest speaker Max O’Connell a test cricket umpire, talk on the Centenary Test. District Governor, Ross Irvine (950) attended as did District Governor Elect (952), Tait Kidman.

A joint services committee with local service Clubs participating was organised to provide entertainment for the spectators after the arrival of Queen Elizabeth at Glenelg on 20th. March 1977. This took the form of a BBQ, Fashion Show and Trading Tables.

A fishing competition sponsored by the Advertiser was held on January 23rd. Some 600 entrants registered, but it was thwarted by the weather and made a profit of only \$80.

The club had a successful night at the Jolly Swagman Inn at Little Hampton.

During the year, 10 members resigned and 4 new members were inducted.

The Club welcomed Junko Takai from Gifu in Japan, and farewelled Leigh de Zwart off to India. Jane Trowse was selected as the club’s outbound student for 1978-1979.

A contribution of \$270 was made to assist with the provision of a Bloodmobile for Chandigah, India, and \$300 for a wheel chair for the Fiji Crippled Childrens’ Society.

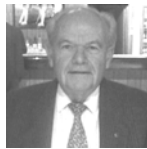
The formation of the Rotary Club of Holdfast Bay, and the sharing of common territory with them. We inaugurated the District Golf Day, and Ivor Lewis received our first Paul Harris Fellow Award. We hosted two exchange students - Penny Cockcroft from South Africa and Junko Takai from Japan. Additionally the Club sponsored an Asian nurse.

Our outbound exchange student was Leigh de Zwart who went to Bombay, India, and we were able to use her as a contact with the Rotary Club of Bombay for an on-the-spot report on possible relief projects. Through this, an amount of \$350 was sent to assist with the provision of clean water to a village named KALME.

Meredith Correll was selected as our outbound student for 1979 - 1980.

We had a joint meeting with other service clubs in the area and commenced Vocational awards at Minda Home.

Community Service projects included assistance with the Peter Nelson Leukaemia Appeal, Christmas hampers for disadvantaged people in the community and the Father Christmas Float in the Glenelg Pageant. Formation of Other Rotary Clubs

The Glenelg Club, as you will see from the family tree, has formed four daughter clubs and they in turn have produced another seven clubs.

Charter President Arthur Wenzel was District Governor's Special Representative to form the Edwardstown Club in 1958 and again held that position in 1978 to form the Club of Holdfast Bay. It is not surprising that at the time of his death he was an Honorary Member not only of his own club Glenelg but also Holdfast Bay.

Clive Nettleton was the D.G's Special Representative to form the Club of Noarlunga in 1966 and Past President Murray Western had that position for the formation of the Brighton Club. Brighton was finally chartered in 1972 in the year of President Graeme McKenney.

These new Clubs played havoc with the club territory and by 1975 Glenelg Club basically had the boundaries of the Corporation of Glenelg. Along Anderson Ave., Sturt River, Morphett Rd. south to Oaklands Rd. west to Brighton Rd. and along the north side of Minda Home to the sea. With more clubs being formed, although housing in the areas was increasing, the owners did not necessarily have a Rotary Classification.

With the formation of Holdfast Bay, who shared our territory, there was a move to share territory with surrounding clubs. Terry Edwards, then Secretary in 1981, succeeded in having Edwardstown, Glenelg, Holdfast Bay, Marion and Morphettville share territory but due to Brighton not wishing to be involved, it had to exclude their area. Then in 1982, after Brighton had chartered Kingston Park they recognised the problem clearly and so requested that in fact these two clubs came into the territorial sharing.

Our present constitution gives the boundaries as - "Within the Corporation of the City of Holdfast Bay, bounded by Anderson Ave., Tapleys Hill Rd., the Sturt River, and north east along Anzac Highway to the Main South Rd. Then within the Corporation of the City of Marion, south along the Main South Rd. to a point reaching the northern boundary of the Corporation of the City of Noarlunga. Then westerly to St. Vincents Gulf and then north to meet Anderson Ave."

LADIES IN ROTARY

The wives of Rotarians have always played an important and most welcome part in the life and activities of the Club. In researching this history, I found that sometimes the wife was better remembered than the Rotarian.

In 1966 a group of ladies started to meet and formed themselves into a club of Rotaryannes initially with Joan Steele as President (Colin was President that year). They met monthly in the morning and with fund raisers and selling craft works the Club supported not only the Rotary Club but many charities in their own right - Flying Doctor, Sunday Mail Blanket appeal, Supporting Mothers, Diabetic Association and many others.

In 1966 a District Ball was held (an annual event) and Heather Steele was an entrant in the Miss Rotary event. As she raised the most money, with the support of the Rotaryannes and the Rotary Club of Glenelg, Heather was crowned Miss Rotary 1966.

The Rotaryannes continued for 11 years as a group and during this time Rene McKenney was President no less than five times.

In 1983 the Glenelg Inner Wheel was established. Inner Wheel has an aim of friendship, personal service and to promote international understanding. Clubs are grouped into Districts and the Districts into National Associations. Membership is open to all wives, or sometimes to family, of

the household of a Rotarian. By 1990 half the members of the Glenelg Inner Wheel Club had her membership from a relationship to a Glenelg Rotarian. Once a member, the associated Rotarian's membership, or lack of it has no effect on the Inner Wheel membership. The Club meets monthly in Partridge House, and is a very active and successful club. The Their Club President in our 50th Anniversary Year will be Lois Hoeper.

At the General meeting of the Rotary Club of Glenelg in December 1989 our By-Laws were changed to accept ladies, with a suitable classification, into membership.

Four ladies have been inducted into the Club and currently we have two lady members, who are very active, and are an integral part of the club. Glenys Fereday was the first lady to be Club President in 1999 - 2000.

Some of the Club's early achievements, and Service to the Community

SENIOR CITIZENS CLUB-ROOMS - COLLEY TCE.

In the early 1960's, Elderly Citizens Clubs and their formation was the "in thing" and the Rotary Club of Glenelg had considered the proposition but land was too expensive. During the Presidency of Angus Neill in 1962, with David Jones as Community Service Director, the Glenelg Council agreed to make land available in Colley Reserve. This was the first Club to have purpose built rooms in S.A. and an architect, J.R.P.Cronin, drew up preliminary plans.

Other Service Clubs in the area were approached to nominate a member for a Board of Control. Lions, Apex, Soroptimists and the Glenelg Women's Service Club did so with Rotary and the then Mayor, H.J. Parkinson. The Liberal Government of S.A. agreed on a \$ for \$ subsidy up to \$3,000. A public appeal was launched, Rotary having obtained tax deductibility for donations.

Rotary had agreed to undertake the building and the other service clubs agreed to provide furnishings and the equipment for activities. Work was commenced in the next Rotary year (1963-1964, President Clive Nettleton) There were subcommittees with different responsibilities but the bulk of the work fell to Rotarian Ivor Lewis. The foundation stone was laid by the then Mayor of Glenelg, W.J. Parkinson, on the 24th May 1964.

The building was a hands on project for our Club and the cost was \$14,000. It was opened by Professor Sir Stanton Hicks on the 8th November 1964.

In the third year, further supervision of the Senior Citizens Club itself was required, but from then on it became completely autonomous. It was a most successful Rotary project and the Club still flourishes today as the Glenelg Community Club.

The addition of an annex was undertaken by the Glenelg Council later, using Government funds and unemployed persons as labour.

THE RETIRED CITIZENS' CRAFT CENTRE

The Community Service Committee in 1972-1973, with Ray Mattiske as Chairman, and Graeme McKenney as Club President, investigated the need for a craft centre to help persons make the transition from a working routine to retirement.

A steering committee, made up equally of retired citizens and Rotarians, was formed and the Glenelg Council, with Mayor Max West, provided a room in their recently purchased Partridge House. The "Retired Citizens' Craft Centre" was officially opened in 1974, during the Presidency of Ivor Lewis, with the Minister of Education, Hugh Hudson, as guest of honour. A fete was held in conjunction with the opening and \$700 was raised. Within two years the area was too small and the Council offered the house at 18 Partridge St. as the new venue for the Centre.

The Centre continued to supply the ability for men and women to undertake many crafts including woodwork, needlework, macramé, painting and soft toy making. The membership has been as high as 130 . The goods produced have always found a ready sale and the centre has become autonomous in both it's finance and administration.

In 1995 The Glenelg Council advised that they required the premises in Partridge Street, and it was decided that the Craft Centre should be merged with the Senior Citizens Club on Colley Terrace to form the Glenelg Community Club. PP John May was heavily involved with the merger and assisted with the setting up of a new constitution.

The Club still maintains a representative on the Board.

BRIGHTON MEALS ON WHEELS

This was built in conjunction with the Apex Club of Glenelg, with many Apexians & Rotarians doing the work plus Ivor Lewis as building supervisor and John Hepton providing the plumbing.

In 1960 - 1961 the Rotary Club of Glenelg paid off a debt of \$3500 for the Brighton Branch of Meals on Wheels. A few years later the Club supplied a new refrigerator, repainted and upgraded the kitchen (with Ivor leading the way) and made other donations at a cost exceeding \$1500.

In 1965, and repeated several times, the Club arranged a dinner dance in the hall in Margaret Ave. Somerton Park in aid of Meals on Wheels

GLENELG MEALS ON WHEELS

This project was shared by the Glenelg Rotary Club, Apex and the Lions Club. The kitchen in David Ave. Glenelg North was built at a cost of \$14,000. (who-else but Ivor doing the work) It was opened by Sir Roland Jacobs on 24th June 1967.

The Club has retained close links with the kitchen and has allocated funds for upgrading it several times since. We provide a Rotarian to the Glenelg committee and also provide a driver once a fortnight.

A new more modern kitchen has been built on the site in 1999, allowing them to maintain a highly efficient service.

GLENELG ROTARACT CLUB

Rotaract is a Rotary sponsored service club for men & women 18 to 28 years of age who are interested in Fellowship & the Community.

The Rotaract Club of Glenelg was sponsored by this Club, and received its charter on June 1st 1973.

The Rotaract Club was very successful for many years, with many projects, and a good relationship with the Rotary Club.

However, in the 1980's it became difficult to replace members, and too much fell on the too few. The Club went into recess in 1988.

PROBUS

The first Probus Club was formed in England in 1966 under the auspices of a local Rotary Club. Its members were retired PROfessional and BUSiness men (hence the name) and the purpose was to create an interesting meeting and to provide new friendships after retirement. The first Probus Club was formed in Australia in Sydney in 1976.

The Clubs meet monthly in the morning and have a guest speaker, visits to places of interest or social outings. It has no other obligations and is not a fund raising organisation.

In February 1981, the Rotary Clubs of Glenelg and Brighton jointly sponsored the Probus Club of Brighton and Glenelg - the first in South Australia. At its inaugural meeting, 46 men attended as foundation members and within eighteen months it was necessary to form two clubs from this one - the two Rotary Clubs co-operated again and the Brighton and Glenelg Probus Clubs were formed.

Since that time, Glenelg has sponsored the successful ladies Probus Club which was chartered in 1986.

The growth of Probus now sees in excess of 1,560 Clubs in Australia.

MORE RECENT ACHIEVEMENTS

The Glenelg Christmas Pageant – Float

In 1994 the Club purchased a Toyota light truck chassis, and a team consisting of Ivor Lewis, Mal McRae, Trevor Whittaker, Trevor Stott and Wayne Dyson "manufactured" the Christmas Float.

They were assisted by Lionel Clarke, a non member, who had expertise gained from the John Martins Pageants. The finished product is a credit to the team who spent many hours on the project.

Each year, the float takes pride of position in the Glenelg Christmas Pageant, with Rotary providing the Father Christmas.

In 2001, the float was "renovated" and upgraded, and signs prepared featuring our 50 Years of Community Service.

Glenelg Primary School

In 1997-1998, in conjunction with the Rotary Clubs of Somerton Park & Holdfast Bay, a decision was made to develop a Rotary Park at the school. The park is located on the old cricket net area by the school, and incorporates an amphitheatre, barbecue area, and the Rotary Tree House. This was a good "hands on" project, with the money raised and work done, as a co-operative effort with the other clubs.

The Holdfast Bay Discovery Centre - Moseley Square

More recently the Club has raised some \$5,000 through two Pioneer Balls held at the old Town Hall in Glenelg, and this money was to be used towards a historical centre in Glenelg.

When the City of Holdfast Bay announced that they were converting the Town Hall into The Bay Discovery Centre, it was decided that the money should be put toward that.

In 2000, under the direction of Brian Snowden and with the help of Peter Heysen, Doug Reiners and many others, a room was renovated to be used as a "Volunteers Room", suitably identified with a Rotary Club plaque . This was a good "hands on" project enjoyed by the members.

District Involvement

The Rotary Club of Glenelg seems to have always been conscious of its place in the district organisation and on a broader scale in Rotary International. It would be unfair, without research which some-one else can do, to talk of members who have served on District committees.

This commitment to District matters continues, as we currently have a membership of 42, yet there are at least six members currently on District Committees.

The Club has provided four District Governors over the years – Terry Edwards, Bill Rufus, John Hardy and Geoff Norman, and more will be said about these members later in this history.

Certainly of recent years we have had a good attendance of incoming officers at the District Assemblies and the same can be said of District Conferences. Scanning the records that we have, we would estimate that in the last thirty years the average District conference attendance has been 12 - 15 Rotarians with their partners.

District Conferences

The Club has been involved in the hosting of five District Conferences over the years :-

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 1958

This was the 9th annual Conference of District 33, which then became District 250, and subsequently split again into Districts 950(0) and 952(0). The conference was hosted by Glenelg at the Town Hall, and the Seaview Theatre.

The Conference was under the chairmanship of Glenelg Club President, Stan Fereday, and 330 Rotarians and 247 ladies registered. District Governor of District 250 was Arthur Sampson who had been the D.G.'s Special Representative from the Adelaide Club involved in the chartering of the Glenelg Club in 1952.

Conference Secretary was Viv Gould and Treasurer Frank George. Reg Rugless was chairman of the registration committee and John Newman was in charge of sound and recording. We have the original reel to reel recordings of the conference and have recently (thanks to John Newman) had this transferred to modern tape. Lance Fenwick was in charge of accommodation, Charlie Godwin the catering, Angus Neill the decoration and Jack Hoepfer the halls. Rex Hart managed the printing and publicity, Owen Bowering the entertainment and Fred Thompson reception and transport.

In our records we have a photo of all participants taken on Colley Reserve.

The conference was opened by Sir Thomas Playford who stated he wanted to take over the western part of Victoria to fit Rotary boundaries. The Mayor of Glenelg, Cec. Anderson spoke, and was full of praise for the West Beach Trust and what it would do for the Glenelg district and envisaged the Patawalonga as a huge lake miles wide.

R.I. President's representative was past R.I. vice-president Harold Thomas from New Zealand, and also present was Past R.I. President, and at that stage the only Australian to have held the position, Sir Angus Mitchell.

The conference was spread over five days from Saturday to Wednesday and included excellent plenary sessions, a band concert, a dance and what was called craft visits to Phillips, Chrysler, Clarksons, A.C.I., British Tube Mills and Trans Australian Airlines.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 1979 : GLENELG

We have already mentioned the District Conference hosted by the Club in 1958 and it was not until 1979 that we had the next opportunity. D.G. Chris Maywald was from the small Club of Taillem Bend and asked us to host his Conference. This was done at the Cinema Centre on Jetty Rd. Glenelg with the Saturday night banquet at the Marion Hotel and the Sunday farewell B.B.Q. at Minda Home. Trams were hired to transport guests to the city but a power failure did not help the otherwise immaculate organisation.

Australian Clem Renouf was President of Rotary International in 1978-1979 but was unable to attend and his Personal Representative was Bruce Williams from W.A.

The Conference was opened on the Thursday evening, 29th March 1979, by the Mayor of Glenelg, Alan Smedley. Keynote speakers were Sleath Lowrey from Sydney, Rev John Hughes and Elizabeth Mansutti. There was a craft display at Woodlands School and a lunch for incoming Presidents at the old Silver City Restaurant in Durham St. The Sunday morning church service was held at St Peters - Glenelg.

Neil Wight was Club President in 1978-1979, Terry Edwards was Conference Chairman, Doug Barton Secretary, and Dean Trowse Conference Treasurer. John Hardy as Committee Chairman, and John Garrett and Bill Rufus planned and led the club's organisation. Graeme and Rene McKenney arranged the most successful home hosting. The Brighton Club managed the farewell barbecue.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 1985 : MORPHETTVILLE

In 1984 - 85 Bill Rufus (after a disastrous start with ill health) was District Governor and we again faced the organisation of another Conference. This was done at the A.B.C.O.S. Centre and the Morphetville Racecourse complex. The theme was "Discover a New World of Service" and the President's Personal Representative was Frank Devlyn, later to become R.I President, accompanied by his wife, Gloria Rita, and daughter, Melanie.

Premier of S.A., John Bannon opened the Conference, on Friday evening the 22nd. March.

The Keynote Speakers were Sir Arvi Parbo, chairman of W.M.C., Jeff Medwell, known as a journalist and radio announcer, and Jon Nicholls, an entertainment promoter and recently appointed to handle the closing day ceremonies of the States Sesquicentennial celebrations in 1986.

Over 600 registrants attended representing 40 clubs. Glenelg Club President was Peter Heysen, Conference Chairman was Jim Chantrell with John Garrett and Arthur Porter respectively Secretary and Treasurer. The Conference committee was Lloyd Allen, Geoffrey Ashton (remember the sailing ship decorations), Terry Edwards, Graham Gillies, John Hardy, Ron Harlow, Peter Heysen and Doug Reiners.

Conference registration was \$60, which included all meals. The church service was conducted at the Centre by the Rev. David Oxley with the Glengowrie High School choir leading the singing.

The new Ivor Lewis Trophy for the best public relations project was presented to the Unley Club for its "The S.A. Police Officer of the Year Award".

A lasting impression of the Conference was of the man from Mexico, Frank Devlyn, and his quiet but dramatic influence on the proceedings. Frank became Rotary International President in 1999 - 2000.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 1992 : WESTMINSTER SCHOOL

PP John Hardy was the District Governor, PP Doug Barton, Conference Chairman and PP Jim Chantrell Conference Secretary.

The Rotary Clubs of Glenelg, Holdfast Bay and Somerton Park jointly hosted the Conference with the venue at Westminster School at Marion. The Mayor of Marion, and fellow Rotarian, Colin Haines, opened it.

The theme of the conference was "Look Beyond Yourself", and District Governor John, made it clear that he wished to portray this message through the life experience of contacts that he had made during his life. Some of the examples of people performing beyond themselves were: -

- The arrival of a 56 year old Rotarian from Corryong, Graham Middleton, who had been swimming down the River Murray from November until March, speaking about his experiences during his 2,200 kilometre swim.
- Ayleen Hughes of Berri who wrote and sang a marvellous rendition of her song "Be Proud".
- Margaret Watson, a Radio Announcer from Mount Gambier who had us laughing at ourselves and reminiscing about the old days.
- Jonathan Chester – the mountaineer, photographer and author who seemed to be so young to have done all these things as well as climbing Mt Everest.
- Matthew Carey, the blind 13 year old son of Peter Carey, a former Glenelg footballer, who told us of the benefits that he had experienced from the use of a small portable computer that Rotary had provided. He touched the hearts of all.

Other speakers included Dr Rod Carter on The Australian Rotary Health Research Fund, R.I. President's Representative Ed Cadman "Look Beyond Yourself", PDG Bill Rufus on World Community Service programmes, a delightful exchange between a young female journalist from Channel 10, and a visiting exchange student from Denmark, on the benefits and experiences of Student Exchange, and "Ourselves as others see us" from PR Chairman Bryon Wicks and Des Ryan of Messenger Newspapers.

Entertainment included the Westminster School Concert Band, and "A Look into the Future" from The Gang Show, superbly handled by DG John Hardy. The final lunch was held at the Warradale Army Barracks.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 1998 : BROKEN HILL

PP Geoff Norman was the District Governor, and the Rotary Club of Glenelg hosted the Conference in conjunction with the two clubs in Broken Hill.

The Conference Chairman was PDG Terry Edwards, ably assisted by PDG John Hardy, and PP John May and their committees.

One of the early highlights was the BBQ arranged for hungry travellers at Oodla Wirra, superbly handled by Rod Goldsworthy and Paul Hoskins. The Mayor of Broken Hill, Peter Black at an official cocktail party, which started the weekend off well, welcomed some 750 attendees.

The plenary sessions were held each morning, allowing time for attendees to enjoy sightseeing tours, arranged golf games, or just relax in the afternoon, and this was appreciated.

Guest Speakers included Jack Absolom - Artist, Mayor Peter Black, Maggie Brown - "War Takes Children's Childhood", Prof Ian Maddocks " Palliative Care", John Lovering - " Murray Darling 2001 Project", Prof John Pearn - "Every Citizen a First Aider", RI President Representative, Chas Clarke, and Bruce Sanderson of the Royal Flying Doctor Service. The RI Theme "Show Rotary Cares" was carried throughout the meeting.

On the social side, The Saturday Dinner at the Royal Flying Doctor Base was a great event, with the Malaysian Airline/Venture Holiday raffle raising over \$5,000. On the Sunday, a lunch in the park was a most enjoyable repast before heading off home.

Sightseeing tours were popular with some 600 bookings for the various tours.

Our Club was successful in winning the award for the "Best Conference Attendance" All in all, a most successful Conference, voted by all as "one of the best"!!

Our District Governors



W. "Bill" Rufus : 1984 – 1985

Bill joined the Rotary Club of Glenelg in 1970 with the classification of Engineering (later Product Development was added to this) running his own business. Away from Rotary, Bill was for many years on the Board of Minda Home which certainly influenced the Club's involvement with that organisation.

Bill was director of Community Service for two years and then served as President in 1982-1983. The Club presented him with a Paul Harris Fellow Award in 1984 and in 1986-1987 he received a citation from the Rotary Foundation for meritorious service.

1976 saw him start his District career with the Interact Committee for three years and in the year 1984-1985 he was District Governor of 952. (Now 9520). During this year he took an active part in the raising of funds for the Rotary House in Sydney. He was on the special ad hoc committee for ANZO Region in 1986-1987 and the special committee concerned for the aged in 1988-1989.

Bill was National Co-ordinator of Polio Plus District 950-952 in 1988-1989 and Polio Plus Representative to District 983 Conference in 1989. He was on the Committee for World Community Service ANZO Region in 1988-1989 and the World Community Service Support Group in 1989-1990. He had been President's Special Representative to District Conferences in District 947 and 946.

He was chairman of World Community Service District 952 and chairman of Central Region Rotary FAIM, and Secretary/Treasurer National FAIM. He was instrumental in planning and raising of funds for the Helena Goldie Hospital in the Solomon Islands.

Bill died in December 1994, and he is sadly missed by the Club and his death is a loss to the Rotary Movement.



Terry Edwards : 1987 - 1988

Terry joined the Rotary Club of Glenelg in March 1967 with the classification of Hairdressing and Allied Services, having his own business at Brighton.

He soon enthusiastically began to accept responsibility, and now, after thirty-five years of membership there are few positions and duties he has not held or performed. He has been a Club Director many times, Bulletin Editor six times, Club Secretary twice and President in 1977-1978. When the Club hosted the 1979 and 1997 District Conferences, Terry was Chairman of the organising committee.

During his early years in the Club, he was introduced to the Youth Exchange Programme both as a host and as Counsellor for Jill Hendrie who went to the Philippines in 1969. Many years of commitment to the programme followed. Supported by his wife, Chris, and their daughters, he has been active in hosting twelve of the Club's overseas students as well as approximately ninety others, for short times, who were part of Youth Exchange. He assisted in the Club's hosting of the "briefing weekend" in 1972, and this was followed by an invitation to serve at district level, which he did for eight years - seven as chairman for Youth Exchange.

In 1982 he was chosen as District Governor's Representative to lead a Group Study Exchange team to the United States of America and this was followed by him being District Chairman for G.S.E. for three years. Terry has served on many District Committees, as Secretary for District Governor Bill Rufus and more recently as District Trainer.

In 1987/88 he was Governor of then District 952. Additionally he has served Rotary International on numerous committees and task forces, twice a delegate to the Council on Legislation, several times as a personal representative of the R.I. President, twice as a Group Discussion Leader at the International Assembly and as co-ordinator for The Rotary Foundation. Nationally he has served as a Director and Chairman of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund.

Terry was first named a Paul Harris Fellow by his Club in 1982 and further honoured in later years. His Club also named him a Gold Companion of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund. He is a Benefactor of the Rotary Foundation; and has received the Citation for Meritorious Service and the

Distinguished Service Award of the Rotary Foundation for his support of its international humanitarian educational programmes. In 2001, upon retirement from the chairmanship of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund he was elected to Life Membership of the Fund.



John Hardy : 1991-1992

John Hardy joined Rotary in 1967 with the Classification of Education Secondary in the Rotary Club of Naracoorte. Transfers in teaching took him from there to the Rotary Club of Largs Bay and then in 1974 to the Rotary Club of Glenelg. Naturally he has served his club in most capacities and has the distinction of being Bulletin Editor for three clubs. He was the President of the Glenelg Club in 1979-1980.

John had a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Diploma of Teaching (Sec) and before his retirement in 1989 had been Principal of Goodwood Boy's H.S., Seaton H.S., Thorndon H.S. and Kidman Park H.S. He served on many professional committees.

Within the community, John was the producer for many choral and theatrical companies and to show his versatility, also coached football, soccer and cricket. He was a member of the S.A.N.F.L. Umpires Board and was also a Justice of the Peace.

In 1939 John joined the Boy Scouts and was later made a life member of the Association. In 1956 he initiated the annual Gang Show - a major theatrical event - and was the producer of practically every show. As well he was involved in the administration of Australian and World Scouting jamborees and was a leader of a contingent of Australians to a world jamboree in the United States of America.

John Hardy was a member of the organising committee for the District Conferences of 1979, 1985, 1988 & 1998. He was involved with youth activities at District level and was chairman of the Group Study Exchange committee following his leadership of a team to Texas in 1986.

In 1987-1988 he was selected as District Secretary for District Governor Terry Edwards, but before the year started he had a Coronary Artery Bypass and could not continue with this commitment.

John served as District Governor for District 9520 in 1991-1992

John died in USA in February 1999.



Geoff Norman : 1997 - 1998

Geoff joined the Rotary Club of Glenelg in 1981 with the classification of Agricultural Services-Dairying. After serving as Director of International and Club Service committees, he became Club President in 1986-1987, receiving a Presidential Citation. He has been chairman of his Club's Membership, Rotary Information and History committees, also serving as Foundation student counsellor. Geoff was appointed District Governor's Group Representative in 1997-1998 and has served on Aged Care and IPAC District committees. He has served on the Central Region RAWCS committee as Registrar, Project Coordinator, Vice Chairman and Chairman. He led a FAIM team of volunteers to Kairiru Island, PNG completing a project there in 1994. The Club made him a Paul Harris Fellow in 1995.

Geoff served as District Governor of District 9520 in 1997-1998. He was responsible for the introduction of the District Leadership Plan to District 9520 with its associated Assistant Governors and the concept of District Administration under the District Management Committee. He is currently serving as District 9520 District Trainer with Governor Peter Sandercock.

Educated at Muirden and Roseworthy Colleges and the University of Melbourne, Geoff spent his early years in the state's Murray Mallee and has been involved in the agricultural industry for most of his life.

Appointments have included Officer-Charge in the district offices at Wynyard and Mount Gambier in the Tasmanian and South Australian Departments of Agriculture respectively. He subsequently became head of the Dairy Section of the Animal Industry Division and then of the Division itself (until his retirement) with responsibility for the supervision of the state's sheep, cattle, pig and poultry industries and the Division's research and extension sections.

Other interests have included tour guiding with the South Australian Museum specializing in Egyptology, Marine Mammals and Aboriginal Culture. As a member of the Glenelg Sailing Club he built and sailed his own boats- 2 Herons and a Hartley 16ft T.S.

He is currently a tour guide with the City of Adelaide conducting lecture tours of the Adelaide Town Hall complex.

Geoff is married to Rosalind, and they have three children and seven grandchildren.

The Rotary Foundation & Paul Harris Fellow Recognition.

The Rotary Foundation has been well supported by the Club including representation at both District and International level by Terry Edwards. Each Paul Harris Fellow Recognition is given in appreciation for contribution of US \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation for its charitable & educational programmes.

Since 1978, when the first presentation was made to Ivor Lewis, the Club has made gifts of US \$56,000 (AU \$100,000 approx).

**Our Longest Serving Member
Ivor Lewis O.A.M, PP, PHF**

1953 – 2001 : 47 years, 11 months

It was with great sadness that we lost our longest serving member, Ivor Lewis in January 2001.

Ivor was an integral part of the Club and is remembered for his many achievements, and total dedication to the Rotary Club of Glenelg, and to Rotary in general.

Ivor Lewis joined the Rotary Club of Glenelg in 1953 with the Classification of Building Construction. The truth is he was nominated as a Charter Member, but as he was finishing a building contract in Alice Springs, his membership was deferred. He has been our most active "hands on member"!

Ivor was born in the country and came to Adelaide to further his career, to coach and play with the Brighton Football Club (winning a "Best and Fairest" and a premiership), to marry Connie more than 50 years ago and to subsequently raise a family. In addition to being a perfectionist at work, he brought a total commitment to his Rotary Service and to his golf. He organised the Club Golf Day at Ashbourne to aid the Diabetic Association for many years, and won the Fereday Cup several times. He assisted Thebarton / Hindmarsh in the District golf day when we were in District 250 and then, when we split to District 952, was the instigator of the District Golf day again. It has been played for the Tait Kidman Memorial Cup for the last 20 odd years and Ivor played every year until his passing.

Ivor's involvement in "hands on" projects has been never ending. To list some:- Brighton Meals on Wheels building, Glenelg Senior Citizens building, Glenelg Meals on Wheels building, the club storage shed and annex (who will ever forget collecting bricks for him on Sunday morning ?) and the preparation and until the past few years, driving of the Father Christmas float in the pageant.

Ivor was President of our Club in 1973-1974 after preparing himself with the Rostrum Club (unfortunately they could not improve his singing!!). He instituted the formal yearly report which has been the saviour of much of our history. He was for many years, the Club photographer and prepared a

most comprehensive photo album of the years activities, which he presented to the retiring President.

At District level he was known as Mr. FAIM for his involvement with this organisation, having led eight teams of volunteers to New Guinea and the Solomon Islands. He prepared display boards of FAIM's activities which were displayed at conferences. He served on District committees for FAIM and also Public Relations.

In 1987 the Club nominated Ivor as Glenelg Citizen of the Year which award he very deservedly won. He was also honoured by being the recipient of the Club's first Paul Harris Fellow Award in 1978. In 1990 the Club further recognised Ivor's service to his community and his tireless work for FAIM by adding a gold pin with a sapphire to this Award.

International Service and Youth Exchange

Patni Hospital in Karachi, Pakistan

Whilst the Club has done many fine International Projects over the years, one of the most satisfying was the equipping of an operating theatre at a charitable hospital at Patni, Karachi.

The hospital was established in 1948 to help a Muslim community which had migrated from the Indian town of Patni at the time of the partition, a year earlier. Families in the area have an average of five children and their income is between A\$1.50 to A\$3.50 per day.

This project came about at the 1993 RI Convention in Melbourne when the Club President of the day, Paul Hoskins was discussing ideas with the President of the Karachi S.I.T.E. Club.

This was followed up by one of our newer members, Rex Sweatman, who was visiting Pakistan with his wife Joyce, and they made a detour to visit the Rotary Club of Karachi (Site) which co-hosted the project.

Rex and Joyce were shown over the hospital, and became convinced that the project should be supported. The project was born with a list of equipment needed which was checked for necessity and priced, and it was agreed that for A\$34,000 a worthwhile facility could be provided.

The Rotary Club of Karachi S.I.T.E. contributed \$2,000, the Rotary Club of Glenelg \$6,000, The Rotary Foundation approved a matching grant of \$ 8,000, and AusAid provided the balance of \$18,000.

A tremendous amount of effort was put in by Rex Sweatman, and the International Committee in pushing the project forward and organising funds, and subsequently Rex was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow Recognition.

The project culminated with a dinner attended by the President of the Australia-Pakistan Association, and a Liaison Officer from the Department of Affairs, Canberra.

Other International Projects

















- For many years the Club has sponsored a student at the Limaru Agricultural College in Kenya. The funds coming from the weekly contributions to "Piggy".
- For many years through the efforts of Ted Coote and Bill Rufus, spectacles were sent to the needy in Africa and the Pacific Islands.
- More recently, restoration work at the Convent Light Street School in Penang, where some \$ A 13,000 was contributed by the Rotary Club of Glenelg, Rotary Club of Penang, and a Matching Grant from Rotary International.

Youth Exchange













The Club has been actively involved in Rotary Youth Exchange since 1968, except for a short period between 1990 and 1993.

This has been a very satisfying exercise, and we have from time to time been privileged to have previous students return to the club in their adulthood. Late in 2001, Pauli Husa (1982-1983 student from Finland) with his wife and three children visited us, and spoke with enthusiasm about the way the exchange had helped him in life.
