When we say, “Join the Dots” we are really talking about logical connections. In Rotary we have some great examples, but this might be a new idea. In all communities and workplaces there are people whom you know, of all ages, having a strong desire to do good in the world - people who are moved when something does not seem to be right. It could be after an international disaster or a local child who needs medical support or even a feeling of doing something physical in a nearby country.

On the other hand, Rotary has the widest range of opportunities to do good. We have terrific local programs for youth, for those with medical needs and more; then we have every possible combination of humanitarian and educational programs in developing countries. In addition we can devise our own programs to meet other challenges.

So we could link up people in the community and our Rotary programs. Those people do not have to actually join a Rotary club but need to be associated with a Rotary club. We need to be flexible enough to handle different people at different times in their lives. For instance a group of young professionals could be given the chance to go Papua New Guinea or Fiji or Timor Leste and participate in a work party for a couple of weeks with two or three Rotarians. Later in their lives they might consider joining a Rotary club. Indeed a secondary school might be encouraged to nominate a team of school leavers to do similar overseas service instead of going on “schoolies week” or a business person might consider donating funds for a shelter box and so do good that way. Have you made these options well known in your community? That gives some idea of what “Join the Dots” might mean in Rotary.

looked across the room and noticed the two visiting guest speakers on their own and looking a little lost..Shirley went across, opened up a conversation and accompanied them to the morning tea table. In Rotary I have observed a similar lack of care for visitors when at one time nearly every club had a protocol which made arrangements on a weekly basis for one member to be on roster to welcome and offer real friendship to visitors whether Rotarians or not. That’s **Joining the Dots** between friendship as we advertise it and friendship in reality.

Recently I have heard a few people in meetings say something like – “we don’t worry too much about protocol here”. Another word for protocol is etiquette or even the words – **good manners**. I don’t believe that those speakers really mean that they want to abandon good manners in Rotary. Good manners in Rotary means connecting the dots between friendship and members or even people you might want to join. Former Rotary International President Bill Huntley said, “Be a Friend”. All of this is a necessary part of continuing effective Rotary as we all want to do good in the world. Let’s “Join the Dots”, keep “Rotary on the Move” and go forward to the basics!

Ilyasi Siraji came to Australia three years ago when he was nineteen; he and his four siblings are refugees from the Democratic Republic of Congo. The journey to Australia took two years from the Congo rather than ten or fifteen that others take; those two years were spent partly in a refugee camp in Uganda. During that time he learnt English in preparation for his final destination of Australia.

Ilyasi has been living in Adelaide since he arrived in Australia. He has been working with refugees and particularly the children of refugees and helping them to assimilate into their communities.

The Rotary Club of Kidman Park in Adelaide sent Ilyasi to Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, a week long seminar, from that time Ilyasi's life changed again. He has been involved with Rotary Youth Leadership Awards since as a mentor for the young people aged 18 to 25 years old who came along to RYLA.

Earlier this year he was able to attend the International RYLA and the 101st Annual Convention of Rotary International in Montréal, Canada. Ilyasi has become involved in Rotaract and was the second President of the Rotaract Club for Global Peace Australia. From this Rotaract Club another Club has started and Ilyasi has it in his sights to help start another Rotaract Club with the sponsoring coming from the Rotary Club of Brown Hill Creek.

Ilyasi has seen the good work that Rotary does and experienced it himself. He wants young people to experience Rotaract and all the good things of Rotary.

Ilyasi is fulfilling a dream because of Rotary, but he is able to fulfil that dream because Rotarians became involved. His vision is to see other young people become involved with Rotaract, RYLA and ultimately Rotary.

There are a lot of people in our communities who want to make a difference to peoples lives and their communities. Rotary can give them the opportunity to do that, to be a volunteer in their local community or in the international community. The problem is they don't know how they can be that "volunteer", Rotary can fulfil their need to be a volunteer.

We need to tell people about our programmes and how they can become volunteers through Rotary. People will join Rotary for a purpose, a purpose that is to help people in their community or the international community. People do feel good about themselves when they become a volunteer because they are making a difference to communities.

Rotary can be a vehicle for people to become volunteers, we need to publicise what we are doing and asking people to contact us to find out more about our programmes where people can be volunteers and fulfil their ideals. Membership Statistics as at 31/10/2010, statement by PDG Rob Wylie:

These are the latest membership figures from R.I. for all Districts in Zones 7b and 8.

Net gain/ loss is shown for:

(1) Previous Rotary year 30/6/09 to 30/6/10

(2) The overnight loss 30/6 to 1/7/10 (when many members who have been thinking of leaving do not renew their membership)

(3) Current year so far 30/6/10 to 31/10/10. This is the most realistic figure to assess progress, as it includes the overnight loss in (2) above, which has to be made up by 30/6/11 if your District is going to break even or have a net gain for the year.

(4) “Comparison to start” 1/7 to 31/10/10 for 9455 and 9465 as figures for (3) not applicable.

The R.I. “Comparison-to-start “ tables for all Districts available on www.rotary.org show net gain or loss from 1/7/10 to 31/10/10, which is usually a more flattering comparison than in (3).

Most Districts have gained members since 1st July, but still have to make up that overnight loss before 30/6/11.

The BEYOND 2000 membership recruitment and retention programme has a list of over 400 different vocations and businesses to help Rotarians to identify potential new Rotarians. If a club works through the list systematically over a few weeks with their membership they will be surprised at how many vocations or businesses in their local community that are not involved in Rotary or other service organisations. After making up a list of vocations and businesses, the club can start to identify people who can be invited to a special Rotary information night.

Clubs with very few women members can use this method to specifically identify women for their club.

If every club was to recruit a minimum of four women into their club over the next six months we would increase our membership across Australia by 4,636 members. 17% of our membership in Australia is women; there is a huge potential to increase our membership by just asking more women to join Rotary.

Clubs can start to identify those potential women and men in their communities by identifying which vocations and businesses they don't have representatives in their club.

"Business of the Year Night"

For the past six years the Rotary Club of Milton-Ulladulla Inc., New South Wales District 9710, has been organising an annual Business of the Year Night. It is held in August and draws over three hundred business people, family and friends, from Ulladulla and districts who enjoy a meal, entertainment and awards presentation.

Ulladulla and surrounding districts on the south coast have a population of around 12,000 and are about 55 kilometres from the nearest bigger towns of Nowra and Batemans Bay.

The award night is conducted on a Tuesday night, the Club's normal meeting night, at the local Civic Centre. It starts at 6.30pm and concludes at 11.00pm, i.e. not a late night so attendees can go to work the following day. Tuesday was chosen so it will not interfere with attendees' weekend.



The award night brings the whole local business community together, where awards are presented in twelve categories including Business of the Year, Best Small Business, Employee of the Year, Employer of the Year, Best Accommodation House, Café-Coffee Lounge of the Year, Hotels - Licensed Club of the Year, Restaurant of the Year, Friendliest Employee and Apprentice-Trainee of the Year.



Local business people get to nominate their businesses and or their employees while members of the community get to vote on customer service and the main awards are judged by independent adjudicators.

The continued success of the Award night is due to the relentless efforts of Rotarian Craig Saunders and his committee. It brings together the whole of the Rotary Club of Milton-Ulladulla where every member helps according to their capability, from ticket selling, setting up the Civic Centre, running the bar, ushering and tidying up at the end of the night.



Every business in the area gets the chance to sponsor the night, with generous contributions providing benefit from recognition and publicity for their role. The Rotary Club gets to raise a considerable amount of money as the night is a major fundraiser for the Club, five figure amount, and Rotary gets acknowledged for its community work.

In the end everyone's a winner.
