## SENIOR ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP?

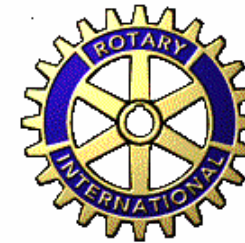
Why senior active membership? Senior active membership carries with it prestige for the holder. It is a recognition of his long experience in Rotary Club affairs.
