Many happy returns to Jackie Ruston who will be celebrating her birthday on Saturday 26th May. We hope that it is a good day for you!

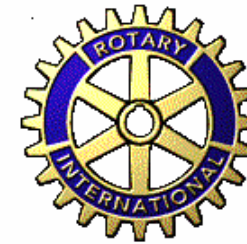


Strange Questions
